On 23rd April, we will see the celebration, on a smaller scale, of St George's Day. Our seniors' lunch this year is dedicated to the theme of St George. As patron saint of England, St George is a bit of an enigma. Very little is known about the real St George. He is thought to have been born into a noble Christian family in the late third century in Cappadocia, an area which is now in Turkey. He followed his father's profession of soldier and became part of the retinue of the Emperor Diocletian. The emperor ordered the systematic persecution of Christians and George refused to take part. In 303, he was himself tortured and executed in Palestine, becoming an early Christian martyr.

The legend of George slaying a dragon and rescuing an innocent maiden from death is mediæval. St George's Day is celebrated in England on 23 April, reputed to be the day of George's martyrdom in 303.

The celebration of St George's Day is linked to a specific English patriotism. In this changing world, there is both irony and hope in the fact that the patron saint of the English is from Turkey. There has always been, in the heart of the English people, an openness and welcome for others, starting with our patron saint, and I pray that St George will continue to be a standard bearer for hope,



welcome and inclusion in the future of this green and pleasant land. Alleluia, Christ is risen!

God's Creatures

One of my best-loved colleagues, when I was teaching, became famous (notorious?) within the school for one particular saying : "It's one of God's creatures".

She would trot out this comment whenever child or adult threatened so much as a fly – but it was very tongue-in-cheek because the next moment she would be swatting it with a rolled-up newspaper or tea-towel.

Now, some twenty years later, "God's Creatures" desperately need our help. "What is Man's role in the whole of Creation? Does Man have absolute dominion over other creatures? Is Man created to be a guardian of Nature and hand it on safely to the next generation?" However, one thing that is for certain is that Man has so far proved to be both the most constructive and destructive creature on the planet.

"God's Creatures" not only need our help – it is in our interests to give it! You often hear talk of the future risk of the Earth being hit by a large meteor and yet our demise is far more likely to be caused by our own destruction of the natural world.

Thankfully, over the last fifty years or so, awareness of this danger has grown and people known as "conservationists" have been at work both as individuals and groups. The need is for ALL of us to become conservationists!

One key realisation has been that the whole of Nature can be regarded as a chain – break a link and the whole chain ceases to function properly. Some links can seem small and insignificant. My own area of interest is insect conservation.



Aesthetically insects can be beautiful, or interesting (or frightening!) to look at – but they are also key pollinators, not just bees but insects in general. Despite the efforts of conservationists, butterfly numbers alone have fallen by at least one third in this country in the past forty years – and bees are still a source of great concern.

No pollinators – very few plants – no green plants – no oxygen, and so on.

So, as Spring approaches, keep an eye out for insects such as bees and butterflies – see if you can spot a Brimstone butterfly (bright yellow or cream) or an Orange-

tip (white with...yes, that's Holly Blue (pale blue with Even earlier, you may see a velvet with four beautiful bright orange, black and Tortoiseshell. These will hibernation. Yes, longer than a day!



right) or a little silvery underside). Peacock (dark eyespots) or a blue Small have come out of butterflies do live

If you see these, try to jot down when, where and how many and keep a record. You now have a valuable conservation record and details can be forwarded (online if you wish) to an organisation such as "Butterfly Conservation". But that's another story!

If allowed, as the year progresses, I will try to tell you more about conservation efforts and what you can do to help.

A SUPREME ACT OF FORGIVENESS

All of us at some time have had some act which has upset us greatly but our Christian teaching tells us we should forgive. Often that can prove difficult and I have so much admiration for those people who openly express forgiveness in the case of the brutal murder of a loved one. I often ask myself, could I be so forgiving in such circumstances? It is easy to say yes when, in the relative safety of your own home. It was this question that drew me to watch the documentary about Eva Kor Mozes a survivor of Auschwitz.

Eva lived with her twin sister Miriam and two older sisters and their parents in Port, Romania. They were the only Jewish residents and farmed the land they owned. Eva and her sister were just 6 years old, having been born in 1934, when a Hungarian Nazi armed guard occupied their village in 1940. In 1944 the family were transported to the regional ghetto and within weeks to Auschwitz death camp. The twins were then 10 years old and soon came to the attention of Dr. Josef Mengele, named "The Angel of Death". He selected Eva and Miriam to join a group of twins to be used as human guinea pigs in his experiments, the objective being to create a supreme Aryan race. Most children died as a result. I will abstain from chronicling his experiments as they are far too horrific for words, suffice to say he did not often use anaesthetic, the thought of which leaves me speechless. Eva would be given as many as 7 injections into her arm in one day, the contents unknown except they were deadly. Her arms and legs began to swell and she felt very ill. She heard Mengele say she would be dead in two weeks, but Eva was determined to live as it was known if a twin died the surviving twin would immediately be killed as being of no value to the experiments. Eva had to crawl everywhere as she was unable to use her arms and legs and the pain was too great. By this time the girls had heard their parents and two sisters had all been gassed.

In January 1945 Russian troops liberated the camp and Eva and Miriam were sent to an Orphanage in Poland. They found a Displaced Persons Camp and located a friend of their mother who helped them back to Romania. Although Romania came under Communist rule the girls were given permission to emigrate to Israel where eventually Eva married an American and went to live in the United States.

In 2015 Eva went to Germany to testify in the trial of one, Oskar Groening, a former Nazi who worked at Auschwitz. Secret filming showed Eva embracing Oskar in an act of forgiveness as she tried also to get him to persuade other fellow Nazis to repent. Many victims of Auschwitz did not agree with her decision to forgive, one Jewish man saying he could not forgive the murder of 50 members of his family. Eva is recorded as saying"The best revenge is the moment the victim forgives the perpetrator as he no longer has any influence on the victim's life." She also asked Groening not only to repent but to teach young people to reform.

Once again I ask myself, in Eva's shoes would I have been so willing to forgive knowing all my family had been murdered. It is very difficult – I would like to think I would do just that but then one questions whether you are being disloyal to the memory of your loved ones, especially if one member happens to be a baby or young child. I admire Eva tremendously after all that she went through and the work she is doing in setting up Charities and a Museum to educate the public. May God walk beside her in all that she is doing.

FAKE GOODS WARNING

Talking about the rise in crime with a friend who used to be a Detective Inspector with the CID, he warned of the mounting number of fake goods flooding the Market. He advised to always use reputable Stores and shops and not be taken in by someone trying to sell, for instance, a well-known perfume for half the price. It is a pity that the genuine trader can be classed the same.

Everything from washing powder to watches, DVD'S to designer clothing. A quantity of washing powder when analysed was found to contain toxic matter. The haul must have been lucrative when you consider a large box is anything from £10 - £12 or more in supermarkets. The giveaway was the actual packaging, the cardboard was poor quality and not so thick as the genuine container. The same with hair shampoos and conditioners, these were found, in some instances, to contain rats' urine and together with the other ingredients caused burning to the scalp and some hair loss. There are some very clever people about these days who, if they used their talents honestly could do a great deal of good. It strikes me that we can learn a lot from the birds because God put a song into each of their hearts and they never fail to sing it.

Beggars and the homeless

Last week, as I entered the churchyard, I was approached by a man who asked me if I could spare 90p. How he looked and the manner in which he asked me is irrelevant; I was, once again, put in a quandary. Of course I want to help people, and if it is financial help then I will also give this (within my resources of course) but I remember



hearing someone(s) saying that I would only be feeding their 'drug habit' or 'alcoholism' so I shouldn't. The following extracts from the April edition of "Erdington Magazine" does not answer my problem, but gives me food for thought.

Overwhelming evidence shows that people who beg on the streets of England do so in order to buy hard drugs, particularly crack cocaine and heroin, and super-strength alcoholic beers and ciders. These highly addictive drugs cause an extreme deterioration in people's health and even death.

Thames Reach's outreach team estimate that 80% of people begging do so to support a drug habit. In Birmingham, in the autumn of 2013, a police crackdown (no pun intended...I'm quoting") on begging, every single one of the 40 people arrested failed a drug test. Many beggars ask for a "few pence" to make up 'bus fare etc. It all adds up...Aggressive beggars are earning £2 800 a WEEK and it's all spent on drink and drugs, says "Big Issue" boss.

Accommodation or a room in a hostel is available from the council via the Home Options scheme. Most people sleeping rough do **not** beg and most people begging do **not** sleep rough.

Our overriding concern should be to save lives. Support local homelessness charities and **don't** give money to beggars!
